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Message from Superintendent Rob Ridgeway



We are leaders. We lead with safety, we lead with integrity. From the beginning we've partnered with parents and staff putting in the hard work and securing resources to bring our kindergarten through fourth-grade students to school daily, and our fifth through twelfth-grade students to school in a hybrid format, as well as offer a 100% virtual option for students and families not comfortable attending school face-to-face, doing what is best for students and families. Nonetheless we cannot rest on our laurels, we must continue to assess and adapt where and when necessary.

For this reason, the time has come for deep conversations regarding when and how to transition our fifth through twelfth-grade students from hybrid learning to in-person learning. I have not been shy in stating that our number one goal is to get students back to in-person learning more days, and your responses and feedback to our monthly surveys corroborate and reflect this desire. However, our goals and desires come with complications and barriers to consider.

The major barrier in bringing fifth through twelfth-grade students back to school daily is distancing. We simply lack the physical space to bring middle and high school students back to school more days while guaranteeing six-foot distancing. While we must do what is right for students, we also must be mindful of the comfort level of our community – students and families, teachers and staff.

As a school district and community, are we comfortable with bringing students back to the classrooms if social distancing is done to the greatest extent possible with a minimum of three feet? This is the subject of a brief but important survey we sent out to stakeholders last week. Ultimately, the decision to change our learning plan and consider a timeline of return rests with our Board of Education.

In the event the Board of Education approves a plan to bring students back to school more days, a return to the buildings would not

happen overnight. Plans for daily operations, including transportation, class schedules, lunch procedures, cleaning protocols, and more would need to be vetted. In addition, staff members will need to have the opportunity to receive their two-dose Covid-19 vaccinations through the Calhoun County Department of Health – a five to six-week process.

Let us lead with optimism and hope as we delve into the deep conversations of returning all of our students back to in-person instruction - our children are counting on all of us to solve this complex situation. I applaud and commend the efforts of our teachers, staff, parents, and community members for Educating, Empowering, and Equipping our students during a pandemic. It has truly been a community effort and remarkable partnership.

programs encourage them to create lifelong healthy habits.









Did you know?

When Educating the Whole Child: Love is Essential

As we move into February, we continue to focus moving our efforts towards educating the whole child, which means that we recognize the health and well being of our youth. During the past year our staff, teachers, and administrators have worked hard to provide a balance of academic and social emotional learning. Love has been the essential ingredient to help us get through this past year.

When considering the wellbeing of each child we are working to implement a Positive Behavior Intervention and Support System (PBIS) and continuing to develop instructional units that will help our students better love themselves and others. The foundation of our PBIS system is developing common language and expectations, and teaching the behaviors that align with what is expected. LEAD is our word that serves as a reminder to guide us through the day. Our elementary staff have recently been trained in PBIS and are starting to implement the strategies together. All teachers will be trained by 2023. The foundation of this work is rooted in our core value "heart for people". Parents are encouraged to use this same language at home and discuss these characteristics when you see them in books or shows you watch. In addition to our learning and work around PBIS we are administering mental health screeners for our

secondary students in order to respond to their needs that are identified and we have elementary strategies to monitor their well being also. We recognize that relationships and supports bundled in love are essential in order to best serve our students and families.



When you start looking at people's hearts, instead of their face, life becomes clear.

Academically we are doing deep thinking about what we want our students to know, understand and be able to do as they exit our K-12 system. These goals are then aligned to priority academic standards and engaging learning experiences. Our elementary teams are currently learning research-supported instructional practices and schoolwide systemic practices. These instructional practices will result in our learners loving to read, write and communicate.

These two highly focused improvement strategies will take a few years to fully implement but we believe when rooted in love and passion for learning we will see the fruits of our collective labor. We invite our families to help us with these improvement



strategies by using the LEAD language at home and providing many opportunities to read a variety of books. We are requesting that our community members continue to donate gently used books for students K-12 to add to our classroom and community library stations. 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Reading: A Lifelong Journey

"Tell me, Muse, of the man of many ways, who was driven far journeys, after he had sacked Troy's secret citadel." - Homer

These words are the opening lines of my favorite story, The Odyssey, by Homer. It's the timeless story of Odysseus' journey to return home, and the adventures and the lessons learned along the way. An allegory of life itself, it's been shared and read for nearly 3,000 years. How is that even possible!

Not all stories will age as well as Homer's, but there are stories that have been told and are being told all around us. As many of us faced the reality of quarantines and being at home more this past year, we turned to stories to pass the time, to problem solve, to cope and find comfort, or even escape from reality. To make sense of life, or to find inspiration in it.

You probably read a lot - you're reading this right now! However, does your daily reading center around Twitter, Facebook, and other social media? When was the last time you read a book, or even an enriching magazine article? Reading has a significant number of benefits! If you're someone who hasn't made a habit of reading regularly, consider this. Like lifting weights for our brain, research shows that reading keeps your brain young and healthy and keeps it from losing its power. Like steroids for your muscles, reading not only equips you with more knowledge, it can improve your memory as you work to remember the multiple storylines, characters, subplots, and more, for each story. It stretches your critical thinking skills as you analyze the story for meaning or try and figure out the next chapter or plot twist. Readers also see improvements to their vocabulary and, not surprisingly, in their writing - qualities that help everyone be more successful.

This fall, some students at HCHS recognized the value in reading and suggested to Librarian Sam Roslund the idea of a book club. A few months and several ZOOM meetings later, after reading E. Lockhart's modern suspense novel **We Were Liars**, the 20 members are now reading the murder mystery **City of Saints and Thieves**, by Natalie C. Anderson.

You can help your student out by reading, too. Reading and discussing together is a great way to spend quality time and model lifelong learning. When I think of reading and quality time with my own kids, I think of the story I read about Alice Ozma. A difficult period in her life lead to 10-year-old Alice and her dad spending a lot of time together, and so they pledged to read together every single night for 100 days. Spoiler alert - "The Streak," as they called it, lasted over 3,000 days - nearly 10 years through sickness, sleepovers, and even prom - and only ended when she started her first day in college. The hardest part of the streak was not maintaining it but ending it.

Here in the cold days of winter, huddling inside to stay warm, and with *March is Reading Month* nearly here, consider starting a streak of your own - and don't be afraid to bring your child along with you.
